Notes to the Financial Statements March 31, 2021 (Expressed in Canadian Dollars)

1. NATURE AND GOING CONCERN

Solstice Gold Corp, formerly Dunnedin Gold Inc., ("Solstice" or the "Company") was incorporated in the Province of British Columbia on June 8, 2017. The Company's registered and records office is located at Suite 1600 925 West Georgia Street Vancouver BC V6C 3L2. On September 18, 2017, the Company changed its name to Solstice Gold Corp. The Company is carrying out exploration of mineral resource properties in Nunavut, Canada.

On May 14, 2018, Solstice began trading on the TSX Venture Exchange under the symbol "SGC".

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") applicable to a going concern, which assumes that the Company will be able to meet its obligations. Realization values may be substantially different from carrying values as shown and these financial statements do not give effect to adjustments that would be necessary to the carrying values and classification of assets and liabilities should the Company be unable to continue as a going concern. At December 31, 2020, the Company had no source of operating revenues, had not yet achieved profitable operations, and expects to incur further losses in the development of its business. In addition, the COVID-19 pandemic could have a material adverse impact on the Company's results of operations, cash flows and liquidity. All of these matters may cast doubt about the Company's ability to continue as a going concern.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

Statement of compliance

These consolidated financial statements for the nine months ended March 31, 2021 were prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB") and Interpretations of the International Financial Reporting Interpretations ("IFRIC") in effect at March 31, 2021. The Company has elected to present the statements of operations and comprehensive loss in a single statement.

The condensed interim financial statements of the Company for the nine months ended March 31, 2021 have been prepared by management, reviewed by the Audit Committee and approved and authorized for issue by the Board of Directors on May 28, 2021.

Basis of measurement

These unaudited condensed interim financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention, except fair value through profit and loss assets which are carried at fair value and have been prepared using the accrual basis of accounting except for cash flow information. The condensed interim statement of cash flows shows the changes in cash arising during the period from operating activities, investing activities and financing activities.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION (continued)

The cash flows from operating activities are determined by using the indirect method. Net loss is therefore adjusted by non-cash items, such as deferred tax expenses (recoveries), stock-based compensation, write-down of exploration and evaluation assets, flow-through share premium, as well as changes from amounts receivable, prepaid expenses, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. In addition, all income and expenses from cash transactions that are attributable to investing or financing activities are eliminated. The cash flows from investing and financing activities are determined by using the direct method.

Critical judgments in applying accounting policies

The preparation of these condensed interim financial statements requires management to make certain estimates, judgments and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the condensed interim financial statements and reported amounts of expenses during the year. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

These condensed interim financial statements include estimates which, by their nature, are uncertain. The impacts of such estimates are pervasive throughout the condensed interim financial statements and may require accounting adjustments based on future occurrences. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods. These estimates are based on historical experience, current and future economic conditions and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical judgments

The preparation of these condensed interim financial statements requires management to make judgments regarding the going concern of the Company as discussed in Note 1.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies applied in the preparation of these condensed interim financial statements are consistent with those applied and disclosed in the Company's audited financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2020.

New standards, interpretations and amendments

The following new standards, interpretations and amendments, have been applied in these financial statements:

IFRS 3 – Business Combinations

Effective for annual periods beginning on or after January 1, 2020, the IASB has amended the definition of a business to confirm that a business must include inputs and a process and clarified that the process must be substantive and that the inputs and process must together significantly contribute to creating outputs. Furthermore, the amendment narrows the definition of a business by focusing the definition of outputs on goods and services provided to customers and other income from ordinary activities, rather than providing dividends or other economic benefits directly to investors or lowering costs. The Company has considered the amendment and assessed that it will have no material impact on adoption.

4. CEBA LOAN

The Canada Emergency Business Account ("CEBA") Loan is an interest free loan to assist with cash flow needs and is provided by the Government of Canada. If this loan is repaid in full by December 31, 2022, 25% of the amount loaned under CEBA is forgiven. The CEBA loan is non-interest bearing and is unsecured. As management intends to repay this loan before December 31, 2022 it has recorded the 25% forgiveness on the initial \$40,000 borrowed, as government assistance as at June 30, 2020. In January of 2021 the Company borrowed an additional \$20,000 under the same government program. If \$40,000 of the \$60,000 borrowed is repaid by December 31, 2022 the Company will be eligible for an additional \$10,000 in loan forgiveness. As management intends to repay the additional loan by December 31, 2022, it has recorded the additional \$10,000 loan forgiveness in the current period.

5. FLOW THROUGH SHARE OFFERING

During 2018 the Company completed a flow-through share offering, and recorded a deferred tax liability for renounced tax deductions.

A deferred tax liability of \$470,507 has been recognized for the forgone tax deductions that the Company has renounced in connection with its flow through share offering. The Company does not expect any impact on cash or liquidity as a result of settling this amount.

6. EXPLORATION AND EVALUATION ASSETS

On February 2, 2021 the Company announced it entered into an option agreement to acquire a 100% interest in the Red Lake Extension project ("RLX", or the "Project") consisting of 10 claims (164 units, ~3300 ha) located in the northern part of the Red Lake Gold District. Solstice acquired the Project, from Gravel Ridge Resources Ltd.

This new Red Lake Project comprises approximately 33 km2 and covers the interpreted extension of the Red Lake Greenstone Belt. The Company is currently formulating plans for a spring program on the Red Lake extension program consisting of ground-work which will be designed to identify drill targets.

The terms of the transaction are as follows and consist of Cash payments totaling \$106,000 over three years and 600,000 common shares of the Company that are to be issued in two stages. Gravel Ridge also maintains a 1.5% NSR that can be reduced to 0.5% for combined payments of \$1.5 million at any time prior to commercial production. To date the Company has made the first installment under this agreement by issuing 300,000 common shares and paying \$22,000.

On March 16, 2021, the Company acquired an additional 2,234 Ha (111 claim units) through staking to cover additional inferred target areas. The RLX property now covers a total of 5,534 Ha (275 claim units) over an area of greenstone which contains extensive electromagnetic ("EM") conductors.

Subsequent to the end of the period the Company staked further ground in the Red Lake area (see note 12).

7. SHARE CAPITAL

a. Authorized and outstanding

The Company is authorized to issue an unlimited number of common shares. At March 31, 2021, there are 99,804,572 common shares outstanding for a share capital amount of \$17,854,089.

b. Share issuances

On June 10, 2020 the Company closed a private placement for gross proceeds of \$1,198,787. The Company issued a total of 29,969,666 units at a price of \$0.04 per unit. Each unit is comprised of one common share of the Company and one common share purchase warrant. Each full warrant entitles the holder to purchase one additional common share of the Company at a price of \$0.06 for a period of 36 months from the closing of the private placement.

On February 2, 2021 the Company paid \$22,000 to Gravel Ridge Resources Ltd for the first payment in connection with the option agreement dated February 1, 2021. On February 9, 2021 the Company issued 300,000 shares to Gravel Ridge Resources Ltd in connection with the option agreement. The fair value of the shares issued was \$37,500. (See note 6).

d. Options

On July 10, 2020 the Company's board of directors approved the issuance of 250,000 employee stock options to a member of management exercisable at \$0.09 per share. The options have a five year term and vest over a period of eighteen months.

On the 10th June, 2020 1,500,000 stock options were granted to the Chairman of the Board, these options are exercisable at \$0.06 per share for a period of five years from the date of grant. Also on the 10th June, 2020 1,150,000 options were granted to the President of the Company, these options are also exercisable at \$0.06 per share for a period of five years from the date of grant. All of the options granted on the 10th June, 2020 vest immediately.

The amount of share-based compensation related to employee stock options for the year ended June 30, 2020 was \$263,745 (2019 -\$464,408). \$124,940 (2019 -\$102,900) was charged to the Statement of Operations and \$138,805 (2019 -\$361,708) was charged to Exploration and Evaluation Assets.

The Company measures the cost of equity-settled transactions by reference to the fair value of the equity instruments at the date at which they are granted.

Estimating fair value for share-based payment transactions requires determining the most appropriate valuation model, which is dependent on the terms and conditions of the grant. The Company uses the Black-Scholes option pricing model to estimate the fair value of options granted. This estimate requires determining the most appropriate inputs for the Black-Scholes model including the expected life of the share option, volatility and dividend yield.

The expected life of the share option was based on the full term of the instrument as at the time of issuance there was not sufficient historical data to suggest a more appropriate term. The risk free interest rate is based on a treasury instrument whose term is consistent with the expected term of the stock options. We have not paid and do not anticipate paying cash dividends on our shares of common stock in the foreseeable future; therefore, the expected dividend yield is assumed to be zero.

9. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

The Company manages its capital structure and makes adjustments to it, based on the funds available to the Company, in order to support the acquisition, exploration and development of exploration and evaluation assets. The capital structure of the Company consists of equity, comprising issued capital, (See Note 9. Financial Instruments – Interest Rate Risk) and deficit. The Board of Directors does not establish quantitative return on capital criteria for management, but rather relies on the expertise of the Company's management to sustain future development of the business.

Management reviews its capital management approach on an ongoing basis and believes that this approach, given the relative size of the Company, is reasonable. The Company is not exposed to externally imposed capital requirements.

10. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Company's financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, deposits, and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. The fair values of these financial instruments approximate their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.

Fair value is defined as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The following summarizes fair value hierarchy under which the Company's financial instruments are valued:

 Level 1 – fair values based on unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities;

- Level 2 fair values based on inputs that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly; and
- Level 3 fair values based on inputs for the asset or liability that are not based on observable market data.

As at March 31, 2021 and 2020 no financial instruments were measured at fair value. No transfer occurred between the levels during the year.

As at the reporting date the Company's financial instruments are exposed to certain financial risks, including currency risk, credit risk, and liquidity risk.

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk of loss associated with a counterparty's inability to fulfill its payment obligations to the Company. The Company's cash is held with Canadian Chartered Banks. The Company believes it has no significant credit risk.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Company will not be able to meet its financial obligations as they fall due. The Company plans to have sufficient capital in order to meet short term business requirements, after taking into account cash flows from operations and the Company's holdings of cash.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that changes in market prices, such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates, and commodity and equity prices will affect the Company's income or the value of its holdings of financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimizing return. As at March 31, 2021, the Company is exposed to minimum market risk.

Interest rate risk

Is the risk that the fair values or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. In May of 2020 the Company received the \$40,000 interest free Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan. The program is operated by the Government of Canada. If the loan balance is paid on or before December 31, 2022, there will be loan forgiveness of 25% or \$10,000. As management intends to repay this loan before December 31, 2022 it has recorded the 25% forgiveness on the initial \$40,000 borrowed, as government assistance as at June 30, 2020. In January of 2021, the Company borrowed and additional \$20,000 under the same government program. If \$40,000 of the \$60,000 borrowed is repaid by December 31, 2022 the Company will be eligible for an additional \$10,000 in loan forgiveness. All receivable and payable balances as at March 31, 2021 are current and as such, are not subject to interest.

11. SEGMENTED INFORMATION

Operating segments are defined as components of an enterprise about which separate financial information is available that is evaluated regularly by the chief operating decision maker, or decision-making group, in deciding how to allocate resources and in assessing performance. All of the Company's operations are within the mineral exploration sector in Canada. The Company operates in a single reportable operating segment.

12. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

On April 13, 2021 the Company announced that we have acquired through staking an additional 9,461 Ha (484 claim units) comprising three new projects; Taillon, Moreau and Berens (the New Projects), approximately 30 km north of our RLX project. Our Red Lake land holdings are now three times the size we had prior to the new staking. Key features of the new acquisitions are summarized below:

- Two of the new projects (Taillon, and Berens) have been mapped as greenstone and extensions of the
 Red Lake greenstone belt by the Ontario Government Survey ("OGS"). Our third project (Moreau) was
 staked to cover nearby extensive electromagnetic ("EM") anomalies which occur over an approximately
 5km strike length. According to the OGS, the Taillon area are "correlative with the Balmer assemblage
 rocks in Red Lake". Most of the major gold deposits in Red Lake are located within Balmer assemblage
 rocks.
- Along with our RLX project, acquired in February, Solstice now controls three of the four known greenstone slivers which extend northwards from the main Red Lake belt.
- Collectively, our four projects cover most of the known EM conductors in the area.
- All of our projects, including RLX, are associated with interpreted major structures. In January 2021, the
 OGS pointed to the potential significance of fault structures in the area which they suggested may
 represent a possible third major structure in the Red Lake belt, the other two being interpreted by the
 OGS to generally correlate with the location of two major gold deposits in the Red Lake camp.
- There is no record of previous exploration in the new project areas despite them being extensions of the Red Lake greenstone belt.
- Collectively, we now control 15,175 Ha (759 claim units) in this emerging exploration play.
